The first official break for the district will be Labor Day on September 3 followed by Fall Break, October 18-19.

Rollover near Mills injures four East Juab juveniles

Four local girls were injured in a single car accident near Mills on Wednesday.

As a result of the accident, Samantha Guillory, Brinlee Taylor, Erin Hansen, and Alisha Richens were all injured in the rollover.

All are students at Juab High School and all are active in girl's sports.

Cory Housekeeper, Utah Highway Patrol Trooper, the investigating officer, said that on August 14, Utah Highway Patrol and Juab County Sheriff's Deputies responded to a report of a single car accident.

A report was received of a red Ford Focus that had rolled over off the right side of the roadway on Interstate-15 near Mills," said Nick Bowles, Utah Highway Patrol Sgt.

The vehicle had four juvenile

female occupants, he said, and all were from the Nephi area.

"All of the young women were found to be wearing seat-belts,'

said Bowles.

All of the girls were trans-ported to Central Valley Regional Medical Center by Levan Ambulance.

The driver of the vehicle, Guillory, was later air lifted to Utah Valley Regional Medical Center in serious condition.

While Bowles did not release the names of the victims, the names of the four young women were common knowledge and a tribute to Guillory was read during halftime at the Juab-Canyon View football game. The accident took place on

the evening of a volleyball game between Millard and Juab High Schools. The girls had attended the game as fans

Bowles said that the cause of the accident was still under investigation.

Jail contracting study and SRO will come

One item needing to be addressed will come from the jail budget and another will come from the sheriff's budget but that budget may need to be readdressed later in the year.

Juab County's portion of a study being done for jail con-tracting will be paid out of the jail budget.

We have received a copy of the RFP for the jail contracting study," said Chad Winn, commission chairman. "Our portion of the study will be \$1,100."

Jail Contracting is used to manage the state inmate popu-



lation in addition to direct management of inmates in state facilities. The program provides inmate housing to the state prison system through contracts with individual county jails.

The counties provide secu-rity, supervision, food and other services on a per day cost basis. Under this program, the department houses state inmates at local jails rather than in stateowned facilities.

In this way, the jail contract-ing program helps the state reduce its own facilities costs, and helps local governments offset costs by filling their excess capacity in local jails.

The next agreement addressed by the commission concerned the funding the county has agreed to provide to help pay for a School Resource Officer (SRO) but an amendment will be required at the end of the year to balance the sheriff's budget because of that expenditure.

. The \$27,976.10 needed to fund the county's share of the Juab School District Resource Officer will come from the sheriff's budget.

a good thing that we have the resource officer," said Val Jones, commissioner. "It is a benefit."

Since the county's portion of the funding, which is one-third of the total cost, is one of the items that Jones oversees, he was authorized to sign the threeway agreement on behalf of the county

Nephi City and Juab School District also each pick up their one-third of the tab.

The amount is not just for the salary of the officer.

In addition to providing regular law enforcement duties the SRO is helping students see officers as liaisons between law enforcement and the school.

They also educate and advise in their role as resource officer.

It is a goal of SROs to make certain that students feel protected and also that they learn there are consequences for their actions.

Without the joint support of the county, the city and the school district the program would not be a functioning reality.

Commissioners decide to purchase larvacide for mosquito abatement program

Juab County Commissioners decided to purchase larvacide to be used in the mosquito abatement program in Juab County.

These corncob mixed granules are good for areas where it is difficult to get to," said Mike Seely, county administrator.

This type of application will allow the spray to be broadcast further on edges of bodies of water, he said. This particular pesticide is sprayed into water to kill mosquito larvae and pupae before they become adults.

If three bags of the chemical are purchased at once, Seely said, then the company will add a new backpack sprayer which will be used to spray the larvacide. The county has an old back-

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
